Hello everyone, our collective work has paid off! I am thrilled to announce the launch of the Parent Mentor Learning Center! The Center builds on the work completed by many of you in the Parent Mentor Learning Collaborative. The Collaborative was funded by Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health, and, now, LPFCH has generously provided continuation funding for the creation of a Parent Mentor Learning Center. The Center has three primary goals:

- Create greater awareness of the value of parent mentors in healthcare settings
- Promote program standards generated by the Learning Collaborative
- Develop a certification for hospitals integrating these standards into their mentor program

These goals will be accomplished through the creation of a "virtual place" for interested parents and clinicians to share ideas, access resources and learn from each other. Over time, we aim to develop agreed upon definitions for the parent mentor role as well as design a set of program standards.

WINNING MOMENTS

In each PMLC Newsletter we will share a winning moment in Parent Mentorship. In the spotlight for this Newsletter is news from Rady Children's.





Rady Children's Hospital San Diego Hematology/Oncology Parent Liaisons Gloria Newell and Judy Wagner joined the team of Dr. Paula Aristizabal, pediatric oncologist at Rady Children's Hospital and UC San Diego, and created COMPRENDO (Childhood Malignacy Peer Research Navigation), a pilot program aimed at improving participation in pediatric cancer clinical trials. COMPRENDO is a culturally and linguistically tailored peernavigation intervention. In this program, parent liaisons with the lived experience of having a child with cancer receive specialized training to support parents of Hispanic children with cancer to help them navigate the cancer diagnosis and the option of participating in a cancer clinical trial.

Based on the success of the pilot program, Dr. Aristizabal and her team at the Peckham Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders were awarded a National Cancer Institute R01 grant. With the new funding, Dr. Aristizabal and her team will expand her research in San Diego and add three new sites:

- Dana-Farber Cancer Institute/Boston Children's Hospital in **Boston**
- UCSF/Benioff Children's Hospitals in San Francisco and Oakland
- University of Alabama, Birmingham/Children's of Alabama

The long-term goal of this program is to improve clinical trial participation in pediatric oncology and ultimately, improve clinical outcomes and survival among all children with cancer equitably.

Now, COMPRENDO will be able to grow and expand across the country to improve access to excellent care in many diverse communities.
