# WINNING MOMENTS



Stanford Children's Parent Mentor program started in 1997 with two parent mentors in one service line. Since that time, the program has grown to 14 mentors in numerous service lines including neonatology, cardiology, oncology, nephrology, and aerodigestive. Mentors meet with parents in the hospital and clinics and provide an array of services: psychosocial support, navigational information and guidance on developing self-management skills. In the past two years mentors have provided services to over 3,074 families. These mentors are considered members of the medical team and are included in team meetings and medical rounds. More recently, mentor services have expanded to provide hospital-wide services to specific populations such as developmental disabilities, and soon, bereavement. This permits peer-to-peer support for underserved populations across the enterprise.

In 2021 Stanford Children's started a second mentor program called "Peer-to-Peer Educators" or P2P. These mentors round weekly on every unit to provide brief education to patients and families on patient safety topics such as hand hygiene, preventing infection, skin injuries and fall prevention. This innovative program supports clinical staff education and supports the development of parents as patient safety partners. P2P has briefed 8,580 families on patient safety topics in the last two years.
